- Accused Job of sinning against God 11:1-6
- God's Wisdom too much for anyone 11:7-12
- Call for Job to repent 11:13-20
- Doctrine of retribution correct ch.20

How does Job respond?

- Job complains against his friends 12:1-13:17
- Job begins to mount his case against God 13:17-14:22
- Job completely rejects Zophar's doctrine of retribution ch.21
