Hebrews 10:11-25(p. 1208)

Introduction: The problem of guilt

"By one sacrifice Jesus has <u>made perfect for ever</u> those who are being made holy" Hebrews 10:14

→ Because of the cross, in God's eyes there is no such thing as a <u>good</u> Christian or a <u>bad</u> Christian. There are only <u>perfect</u> Christians.

- 1. Christians have been made perfect
 - a. Our sin has been completely forgiven at the cross (v12, v16-17)

b. Jesus' perfect record has been given to us

"God made Jesus who had no sin to be sin for us, so that in him we might become the righteousness of God"

2 Corinthians 5:21

3. What that means for us now (v19-25)

a. No guilt (v22)

"Whenever the devil charges us with our sins and pronounces us guilty of death and hell, we ought to say to him: I admit that I deserve death and hell; what, then, will happen to me? [The Devil replies:] Why, you will be eternally damned! [The Christian answers:] By no means; for I know One who has suffered and made satisfaction for me. His name is Jesus Christ, the Son of God. Where He abides, there will I also abide." Martin Luther, Table Talk

Three practical steps to dealing with guilt:

Repent If we feel guilty, is it because there's an area of sin that we continue to live in?
Rejoice By his death Jesus has made us perfect for ever! Believe it, and be joyful!
Repeat Keep doing this for the rest of your life!
